

Collect for the First Sunday of Lent

Grant, almighty God, through the yearly observances of holy Lent, that we may grow in understanding of the riches hidden in Christ and by worthy conduct pursue their effects.

From a commentary on the Psalms by St Augustine, bishop († 430)

Hear, O God, my petition, listen to my praver; I cried out to you from the ends of the earth. Our pilgrimage on earth cannot be exempt from trial. No one knows himself except through trial, or receives a crown except after victory, or strives except against an enemy or temptations. The one who cries from the ends of the earth is in anguish but is not left on his own. Christ chose to foreshadow us. who are his body, by means of his body, in which he has died, risen, and ascended into heaven, so that the members of his body may hope to follow where their head has gone before. He made us one with him when he chose to be tempted by Satan in the wilderness. In Christ you were tempted, but by his own power Christ gained life for you; he suffered insults in your nature, but by his own power gained glory for you; he suffered temptation in your nature, but by his own power gained victory for you. If in Christ we have been tempted, in him we have overcome the devil. Do you think only of Christ's temptations and fail to think of his victory? See yourself as tempted in him and see yourself as victorious in him. Had he not been tempted he could not have taught you how to triumph over temptation.

From the Pastor's Desk

"When in Rome, do as the Romans do," goes the expression. I suppose we could paraphrase this for Lent: "When in Lent, do as the *Lentens* do." Well, in the holy season of Lent, we Catholic *Lentens* collectively commit ourselves in a special way to prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. We do this in order to atone for our sins, to imitate our Lord, and to grow closer to God by these spiritual disciplines.

Wednesday and Ash Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence Fasting be is to by observed Roman Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other "light meals" may be taken according to each one's needs (like to maintain strength, especially for work), but together they should not equal another

full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed. In short, those who fast should feel some hunger during the day and offer their hunger sacrificially.

Abstinence from meat is observed by Catholics 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat may be eaten. Fridays during Lent are also days of abstinence.

PRAYER FASTING AND ALMSGIVING

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If you have any doubts concerning fast and abstinence, you may always consult your parish priest.

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The roughly forty days of Lent correspond, of course, to the Biblical "forties" that we know so well: the forty days and nights of rain during the great flood which Noah and his family rode out in the ark; Israel's forty years of wandering in desert exile under the leadership of Moses as they journeyed to the promised land; the forty days and

nights during which the Lord Jesus fasted, prayed, and was tempted in the desert before coming forth to proclaim the Kingdom of God.

These periods of "forties" have this in common: they are times of purification, purpose, and promise. Purification, because in them God refined his people in penance, or in the case of Christ in the

desert. Jesus offered himself to the Father in penance. Purpose, because each period is part of the divine plan to restore what was lost in the Fall and to renew all things. And promise, because at the end of each of the "forties," those who underwent the purification and God's purposes staved faithful to received the promise: after Noah, the reestablishment of all creation: after Moses, the promised land; after Christ, the Kingdom of God, which even today is in our midst.
