

O God, protector of those who hope in you, without whom nothing has firm foundation, nothing is holy, bestow in abundance your mercy upon us and grant that, with you as our ruler and guide, we may use the good things that pass in such a way as to hold fast even now to those that ever endure.

From a sermon by St Caesarius of Arles, bishop (†542)

What kind of people are we? When God gives, we wish to receive, but when he begs, we refuse to give. When the poor are starving, Christ too hungers. Christ hungers now, my brethren; it is he who deigns to hunger and thirst in the persons of the poor. And what he will return in heaven tomorrow is what he receives here on earth today. What do you wish for, what do you pray for, my dear brothers and sisters, when you come to church? Is it mercy? How can it be anything else? Show mercy, then, while you are on earth, and mercy will be shown to you in heaven. A poor person asks you for something; you ask God for something. He begs for a morsel of food; you beg for eternal life. Give to the beggar so that you may merit to receive from Christ. For he it is who says: Give and it will be given to you. It baffles me that you have the impudence to ask for what you do not want to give. Give when you come to church. Give to the poor. Give them whatever your resources will allow.

From the Pastor's Desk

St Ignatius of Loyola, whose feast day is July 31, was one of the masters of the spiritual life. Ignatius was born in the Basque region of Spain in 1491 and died in Rome in 1556. With Sts Peter Faber and Francis Xavier, he founded the Jesuit order. He is best remembered today for

his writings on the spiritual life, particularly his Spiritual Exercises, in which he recorded his experience and his method in the ways of prayer and discernment. Millions have followed Ignatian way of prayer with great benealways drawing fit. closer to Christ, who is the heart, soul, and center of St Ignatius' spiritual way. The motto of the Jesuit order, and one of the hallmarks of Ignatian spirituality is: majorem ad Dei gloriam, which means for the greater glory of God. All things - all thoughts, all desires, all

actions, whether I sleep or am awake, whether I am ill or in good health, whether I stay or I go - all things for

God's greater glory.

Speaking of doing things for the greater glory of God, I was deeply impressed by our parish's recent food distribution event, which was spearheaded by Mr

Marcus Bruno. Some fifteen or sixteen St Patricians showed up to prepare the food distribution bags at Second Harvest on Thursday, July 19, and another sizable group volunteered the next morning at our parish hall for the distribution event. Three hundred food bags were prepared, and in the space of an hour and half, about two hundred sixty of them were given out. The rest were sent to shut-ins

or redirected to United Christian Outreach. Visitors were able to receive materials and information from several booths set up to address health care concerns. Our Lady of Lourdes. Louisiana Department of Health. AmeriHealth Caritas, and Second Harvest all participated in this event that was meant to reach those who have limited food security. This first event, I am sure, will lead to others like it in the future. My thanks and gratitude to all parishioners who contributed time, talent, and treasure in this good work for the poor of our city.
