

From a letter to the Corinthians, by St Clement, pope (†99)

Dear friends, we must live lives worthy of God and in mutual harmony do what is good and acceptable in his sight. He tells us: The Spirit of the Lord is a lantern, searching the hidden places of our inmost being. We must remember how near he is and that no thought of ours. conversation we hold is hidden from him. It is right, therefore, that we should not turn our backs and flee from God's will. We should rather give offense to stupid and foolish men, puffed up and taking pride in their boastful speech, than give offense to God. Your children must share in the way of discipleship in Christ. They must learn how effective humility is before God, what chaste love can accomplish with God, how good and noble is the fear of God, for it brings salvation to all who possess it and who live holy lives with a pure heart. The Father is merciful in all he does and full of generosity; he is loving to those who fear him. In goodness and gentleness he gives his graces to those who approach him with undivided hearts. We must then put away all duplicity and not be distrustful in the face of his excelling and ennobling gifts.

The first will meeting be Tuesday, September 26, from 8:15-9:15 a.m. in the conference room of our parish office building. All St Patrick's women are invited, whether you followed the last bible study or not.

Although it's still ten weeks away, I thought it good to remind everyone

of our parish fall social, "Friendsgiving in Christ," which is held two Sundays before Thanksgiving. This year, that falls on Sunday, November 12. As in the past, this social will be held in our parish hall after the 10 a.m. Mass. St Patrick's furnishes the main meat dishes, and all participants are encouraged to bring a covered dish — whether salad or vegetable, a casserole or dessert. Bring your favorite homemade dish to share

with other St Patricians! There is no cost or admission fee for this social event, but we will be taking up canned goods and dried goods to be donated to United Christian Outreach for distribution to the poor and needy.

In my homily last Sunday, I began with a passage from Fr Thomas Merton's *New Seeds of Contemplation*, where he wrote

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"A Catholic poet should be an apostle by being first of all a poet, not try to be a poet by being first of all an apostle. For if he presents himself to people as a poet, he is going to be judged as a poet and if he is not a good one his apostolate will be ridiculed."

Being "Catholic" will not make up for being a poor poet, nor will it make up for being an incompetent professional of any type. Hence Merton's admonition that we must excel at our endeavors, and by

that excellence we will then do honor to our commitments as Catholics. In this way, people will see first our determination and excellence, and then, learning that we are Catholic, they will also respect our faith commitment as something serious and worthy. This is how disciples are made, and how the skeptical and dubious are won over to Christ.
