

May your grace, O Lord, we pray, at all times go before us and follow after and make us always determined to carry out good works.

Whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old has passed away. By the "new creation" Paul means the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in a heart that is pure and blameless, free of all malice, wickedness, or shamefulness. When a soul has come to hate sin and has delivered itself as far as it can to the power of virtue, it undergoes a transformation by receiving the grace of the Spirit. Then is it healed, restored, and made wholly new. Yet the tempter spreads many a snare to trap the soul, and of itself human nature is too weak to defeat him. This is why the Apostle bids us to arm ourselves with heavenly weapons, when he says: Put on the breastplate of righteousness and have your feet shod with the gospel of peace and have the truth around your waist as a belt. Can you not see how many forms of salvation the Apostle indicates, all leading to the same path and the same goal? Following them to the heights of God's commandments, we easily complete the race of life. For elsewhere the Apostle says: Let us run with fidelity the race that has been set before us, with our eyes on Jesus, the origin and the goal of our faith.

From the Pastor's Desk

An indispensable part of the Eucharistic revival is a renewal of the priestly office and priestly service. For without our priests, we would not have access to the holy Eucharist. The Church, as the assembly of all the holy ones of God, is nourished by the Eucharist, the living bread from heaven, which is brought to the Church by her priests, who are called to feed the flock of Christ after the example of the Lord, who came not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many (Mk 10:45).

According to a recent study of newly ordained priests, the most influential people in their decision to enter the seminary was their parish priest, followed by their parents, followed by friends and other parishioners. Key to promoting vocations to the priesthood is a personal invitation by a priest, a parent, a parishioner, or a friend to consider that vocation. When a young man hears from those he knows and respects that they see in him some Christ-like quality, that word of encouragement or invitation can revolutionize how he views his own calling. It can give him the courage to seriously and prayerfully consider whether God is calling him to be a priest.

Knowing this, how can we not give the young men in our lives encouragement and permission to discern a calling to the priesthood? Since we depend on the Eucharist to sustain us in our Christian journey, then each of us must do our part to promote priestly yocations.
