Grant us, we pray, O Lord our God, the constant gladness of being devoted to you, for it is full and lasting happiness to serve with constancy the author of all that is good.

From a sermon by St Gregory Nazianzen, bishop (†390)

What is man that you are mindful of him? (Ps 8:4). What is this new mystery surrounding me? I am both small and great, both lowly and exalted, mortal and immortal, earthly and heavenly. I am to be buried with Christ and to rise again with him, to become a coheir with him, a son of God, and indeed God himself. This is what the great mystery means for us; this is why God became man and became poor for our sake: it was to raise up our flesh, to recover the divine image, to recreate mankind, so that all of us might become one in Christ who perfectly became in us everything that he is himself. If only we could be what we hope to be, by the great kindness of our generous God! He asks so little and gives so much, in this life and in the next, to those who love him sincerely. In a spirit of hope and out of love for him, let us then bear and endure all things and give thanks for everything that befalls us. And meanwhile let us commend to God our own souls and the souls of those who, being more ready for it, have reached the place of rest before us although they walked the same road as we do.

From the Pastor's Desk

Last Sunday, our parish celebrated our fall social – Friendsgiving in Christ – with our biggest turnout yet, 135 St Patricians. The food was abundant and delicious; the fellowship was outstanding; faith was on display as boxes and bags of goods were collected to be distributed to those in need through United Christian Outreach.

So many St Patricians volunteered to organize this event, to set up for it, to clean up afterward. I am truly grateful for all of you. I won't mention all your names here, as the risk of missing someone is too great! But you, our parishioners, never fail to step up when needed.

The same can be said for our efforts at creating a parish photo directory. The photography sessions are now concluded, and we're moving into the design phase of the photo directory. Again, this entire work was carried out by parish volunteers - those who organized the sessions, those who staffed the sessions, those who made phone calls and scheduled and did all sorts of behind-thescenes acts of service. For all of you, I am truly thankful. If you haven't yet managed to get your photo taken, there may still be time. Please contact the parish office right away, and we'll see what accommodations can be made.

Each year in May and October, all parishes in the Diocese of Lafayette take attendance at weekend Masses. This gives us a fairly reliable idea of the number of people attending Mass at each parish in the Diocese.

I thought I'd share with you the Mass counts for the past five years here at St Patrick (which is as long as I've been here as your pastor).

A little context in reviewing these numbers. You'll remember that 2020 and 2021 were covid years. That certainly accounts for the drastic drop in Mass attendance. Then in October 2022, we were celebrating Mass in the parish hall due to the HVAC replacement project in church. Now in 2023, it seems that our parish is again approaching its typical Sunday Mass attendance.

What about daily Mass, some of you might be wondering. Daily Mass at St Patrick's brings in from 50 to 70 people. During Advent and Lent, that number usually surges to 70 to 90 people. Obviously there is no obligation to attend Mass during the week. But those who do find it to be a powerful way to connect to the Lord through scripture and sacrament. It's something each Catholic should prayerfully consider and try to find time, even just once a week, to attend Mass during the week.
