Almighty ever-living God, who govern all things, both in heaven and on earth, mercifully hear the pleading of your people and bestow your peace on our times.

From a letter by St Ignatius of Antioch, bishop and martyr († ca. 100)

Try to gather together more frequently to give thanks to God and to praise him. For when you come together frequently, Satan's powers are undermined, and the destruction that he threatens is done away with in the unanimity of your faith. Nothing is better than peace, in which all warfare between heaven and earth is brought to an end. None of this will escape you if you have perfect faith and love toward Jesus Christ. These are the beginning and the end of life: faith the beginning, love the end. When these two are found together, there is God, and everything else concerning right living follows from them. No one professing faith sins: no one possessing love hates. A tree is known by its fruit. So those who profess to belong to Christ will be known by what they do. For the work we are about is not a matter of words here and now, but depends on the power of faith and on being found faithful to the end. He who has the word of Jesus can truly listen also to his silence, in order to be perfect, that he may act through his speech and be known by his silence. Let us then do everything in the knowledge that he is dwelling within us that we may be his temples, and he God within us.

From the Pastor's Desk

We are now just a couple of weeks into the new year, 2024, and so I thought I would share with you a few reflections about beginning a new year.

Many people formulate resolutions for themselves when a new year begins, things that they resolve to do to better their lives or the lives of others. We make commitments to eat better, to exercise, to pray and grow in our faith. Ex-

perience shows, however, that most of us don't hold on to our resolutions beyond a week or so.

So here is my encouragement to any and all who have made New Year resolutions and have already found their resolve lacking: Do not be discouraged! We are, all of us, perpetual beginners. So there is no shame beginning again. The only

"shame" – at least as I see it – is in not making a fresh start, however many fresh starts we have to make.

This take the virtue of is а on perseverance. When we find that we've slacked off on some good thing that we've proposed or resolved to do, the remedy is not anger or frustration or demoralization, but perseverance, gentle yet firm. Without judgment or criticism of ourselves, and with a dose of good humor and good will toward ourselves, we just start afresh, stirring up a spirit of fervor and optimism that with God at our side, we can do all things. Indeed, Scripture teaches us well: "I can do all *things in him who strengthens me*" (Phil 4:13).

As a practical point, I would suggest that we cannot make good on our resolutions simply by thinking about them or praying about them. We have to *act upon them*. Which means overcoming our hesitations and laziness, our doubts and comfortseeking. When we begin to act, to do, the grace of God is always in good supply. And before we know it, the thing we were struggling to rouse ourselves to do

becomes something that gives light and joy, purpose and reward.

I want to leave you with a few points on perseverance by St Josemaria Escriva, taken from his little book, *The Way*:

 You went astray and did not come back because you were ashamed to. It would be more logical if you were ashamed not to return.

 Discouragement is an enemy of your perseverance. If you don't fight against discouragement you will become pessimistic first, and lukewarm afterwards. Be an optimist.

- Give thanks to God who helped you, and rejoice in your victory. What deep joy you feel in your soul, after responding to grace!
- And what is the secret of perseverance? Love. Fall in Love, and you will not leave him.
