From a letter to the Corinthians by St Clement I, pope and martyr († 99)

Let the one truly possessed by the love of Christ keep his commandments. Who can express the binding power of divine love? Who can find words for the splendor of its beauty? From the Pastor's Desk

January 22 is the 51st anniversary of the Supreme Court decision Roe v. Wade, which legalized abortion in all 50 states. Every year, tens of thousands of pro-life Americans converge in Washington, D.C., in the cold of winter, to bear public witness for life by marching through the National Mall, past Capitol Hill, and before the Supreme Court.

The March for Life is an inspiring, peaceful, and joy-filled rally of women, men, young people, and children from all across the country. It is the largest human riahts demonstration in world, but it is not merely a protest. It is a witness to life, a celebration of each and every life from the very moment of conception.

We all know that Roe v.

Wade was overturned about a year and a half ago, on June 24, 2022, by the Supreme Court decision called Dobbs. This decision, though, did not make abortion illegal throughout the United It merely overturned States. allowing the question of the legality of abortion to be determined by the individual states.

This means that the focus of pro-life efforts is not longer primarily on the federal level, but on the state and local level. The fight to enshrine a pro-life ethos into our national, state, and local laws remains real and difficult. Consider for a moment that in 2022, voters in California, Kentucky, Michigan, Montana, Vermont, and Kansas either rejected restrictions on abortion or expanded legal protection for abortion. In 2023, Ohio voters passed a measure in the state guarantee constitution abortion to access. In 2024, Maryland and New York will vote to amend their constitutions to include abortion, and several other states have ongoing or pending efforts to do the same. So far, some 24 states have pro-

life protections restricting

abortion.

The energies of the prolife movement cannot be allowed to wane, as if the overturning of Roe v. Wade were the final victory... not while there are still over 900,000 abortions each year in the United States. Hence. the continuing need for the witness of the March for Life

Many people from Acadiana, including many young people, were in Washington, D.C. this past week, braving the frigid temperatures in order to give witness to the sanctity of life. For three days, from Wednesday to Friday, they participated in meetings, educational workshops, and conferences concerning life issues and public policy. And then on Friday, January 19, they marched prayerfully and peacefully to bear witness to the sacredness of human life. May our efforts to build a culture of life prevail. Fr Guillory
