

God's word offers different facets according to the capacity of the listener, and the Lord has portrayed his message in many colors, so that whoever gazes upon it can see in it what suits him. Within it he has buried manifold treasures, so that each of us might grow rich in seeking them out. The word of God is a tree of life that offers us blessed fruit from each of its branches. And so whenever anyone discovers some part of the treasure, he should not think that he has exhausted God's word. Instead he should feel that this is all that he was able to find of the wealth contained in it. Nor should he say that the word is weak and sterile or look down on it simply because this portion was all that he happened to find. But precisely because he could not capture it all he should give thanks for its riches.

From the Pastor's Desk

What a lineup of events and celebrations we have this week! Today, the Sixth Sunday of Ordinary Time just so happens to be Super Bowl Sunday. And for many people, the Super Bowl is its own liturgy, a whole day consecrated to American football. Well, for us Catholics, and for us St Patricians, we know why Sundays are consecrated first of all to the Lord. Sunday is the *dies Domini*, the day of the

Lord, when we celebrate his resurrection from the dead. After giving thanks to God in the act of divine worship that is our Eucharistic gathering, the Mass, we are free to delight and play and rest and take our ease. It is fitting, then, that on this Sunday in particular we wholeheartedly enjoy the spectacle and celebration that is the Super Bowl.

On Friday mornings during Lent, it is our custom at St Patrick's to pray the Way of the Cross together before morning Mass. So please join us for the Way of the Cross, which will begin at 7:05 a.m. each Friday of Lent.

Now remember that when it comes to choosing a Lenten penance, it is best to undertake a penance that is sustainable. Better a small act of self-denial that I can sustain for the whole of Lent than an ambitious penance that I give up after



only a few days. Plus, we need to remember that the Lenten practices are not only about self-denial, but also about growing in prayer and contributing to the poor. So *prayer*, *fasting, and almsgiving* are all part and parcel of the Lenten walk with Jesus.

Then, on Wednesday we Catholics celebrate Ash Wednesday, which is a day of fasting (for ages 18-59) and abstinence from meat (age 14+). As Lent begins, we turn away from sin, embrace our penances, and repent for forty days.

Ash Wednesday just so happens to fall on February 14 this year, putting a damper on Valentine's Day. But look, our priorities as Catholics are clear. First, the Lord, then everything else. So be sure to adapt your Valentine routine before or after Ash Wednesday. Honor your sweetheart, but honor God first! poor this Lent, perhaps by contributing to the Ash Wednesday collection, which you can do on Ash Wednesday in church or online (see the flyer in this bulletin).

To help you grow in prayer this Lent, our parish is making available a little Lenten booklet called *Repent and Believe*. It is meant to be a guide to reflection and prayer for each day of Lent.

May our Lent begin well and with God's grace bring us to the joy of Easter!
