From a sermon by St Gregory Nazianzen, bishop († 390)

Blessed are the merciful, because they shall obtain mercy, says the Scripture. Again: Blessed is he who is considerate to the needy and the poor. Once more: Generous is the man who is merciful and lends. In another place: All day the just man is merciful and lends. Let us lay hold of this blessing, let us earn the name of being considerate, let us be generous. Not even night should interrupt you in your duty of mercy. Do not say, "Come back and I will give you something tomorrow." There should be no delay between your intention and your good deed. Generosity is the one thing that cannot admit of delay. Share your bread with the hungry, and bring the needy and the homeless into your house, with a joyful and eager heart. He who does acts of mercy should do so with cheerfulness. The grace of a good deed is doubled when it is done with promptness and speed. What is given with a bad grace or against one's will is distasteful and far from praiseworthy. When we perform an act of kindness we should rejoice and not be sad about it. If you undo the shackles and the thongs, says Isaiah, that is, if you do away with miserliness and counting the cost, with hesitation and grumbling, what will be the result? Something great and wonderful! What a marvelous reward there will be: Your light will break forth like the dawn, and your healing will rise up quickly. Who would not aspire to light and healing?

From the Pastor's Desk

Passiontide. This is the period in the Church liturgical year that takes in the last two weeks of Lent, beginning with the fifth Sunday of Lent. Next Sunday is Palm Sunday. Then we enter Holy Week, which culminates in the celebration of the Sacred Paschal Triduum: the liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, the Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday.

We are now deep into Lent, deep into the desert with the Lord, and even the décor of the church reflects this reality. During Passiontide, it is customary to cover images and statues, to remove from our sight anything that speaks of life and beauty, like the greenery of decorative plants or flowers. All this in order to represent the stark and barren reality of the desert experience.

It is now the time for us to

embrace with greater zeal and intensity our Lenten penances and observances. Those who persevere to the end will be amply and generously rewarded. The greater our Lenten self-denials, the greater our Easter joy. The greater our spiritual preparations during Lent, the more we will rejoice in the Spirit when the Lord surges from the tomb on the day of his Resurrection. Our parish feast day, St Patrick's Day, March 17, falls on a Sunday in Lent this year. Which means that this year the liturgical observance of St Patrick is omitted. However, we still gathered together as a parish community on Saturday, March 16, for our annual St Patrick's breakfast, our spring social. I am grateful to all who worked to organize and plan for this event, as well as for the many St Patricians who came to enjoy a morning of food, faith, and fellowship. As we get to know one another better as

members of the same parish community, we grow together in the bonds of charity and offer a witness to the world as disciples, followers, of the Lord Jesus.

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Our parish photo directory is one way in which we will be able to get to know each other better. I'm hoping that it will be delivered by the end of the Easter season. Just last week we received the proof copy of the photo

directory, and we are now proofreading it, correcting some few stray errors and misprints. We will soon return this to the publishing company and then await the delivery of the final product. Again, I am very grateful for all the volunteers who have collaborated in this effort. Without you, this would not have happened.
