From the Pastor's Desk

June 30 marks a rather new and unique feast day of the saints in the Roman Catholic Church. It is the memorial of the first martyrs of the Holy Roman Church. This feast day was instituted in 1969 to gather together into one celebration the commemorations of dozens of relatively minor Roman martyrs.

But the feast of the "protomartyrs" of Rome is meant to draw special attention to the persecution of Christians under the direction of the Emperor Nero, a debased and depraved man. In the year AD 64, a fire broke out in Rome that destroyed about two-thirds of the city, perhaps due to Nero's ordering the fire, which then burned out of control, to make room to enlarge his palace. In order to quell the rumors circulating against him, whether or not they were true, the already unpopular Nero scapegoated the small Christian community in Rome and began rounding them up, putting them to death in theatrically brutal ways.

Witness to this is the Roman historian Tacitus, who, though he looked down on Christianity as a "destructive superstition," truly despised Nero, who, he asserts, "falsely accused and executed with the most exquisite punishment those people called Christians." Around AD 118 Tacitus wrote: "those who admitted their faith were seized first, and then, with the information they provided, a vast multitude was convicted, not so much for the crime of burning the city, but for hatred of the human race. Their deaths came about as if by bloodsport: they were covered with the skins of beasts and killed by hunting dogs, or were nailed to crosses, or set aflame and burned like nighttime lamps once the sun had gone down. Nero used his own gardens for this spectacle and put on a show in the circus, dressing like a charioteer and mixing with the commoners or driving about the race course. Even though the Christians were clearly guilty [of following a false superstition] and deserved being made an example of, people began to pity them, because they were made to suffer not for the public good but on account of one man's cruelty."

This was also the timeframe during which both St Peter and St Paul were put to death in Rome, Nero's deadly savagery sweeping up the princes of the Apostles, who both ended their days, martyred, in the Eternal City.

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I count it a blessing that I was ordained a priest on June 30 and that my ordination gained for me the heavenly patronage of such a cloud of heroic witnesses to the faith. The protomartyrs of Rome suffered cruelly for their faith in Christ and gave the ultimate witness to their hope in Jesus as the resurrection and the life. As God's grace and mercy kept them faithful in the face of loss, ridicule, and unimaginable physical suffering, may we remain faithful to the grace of God, which is never lacking to those who seek first his kingdom and his righteousness.
