# From the Pastor's Desk

Five loaves and two fish. "But what good are these for so many?" This was the question that Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, asked Jesus. The disciples were soon to see, to learn, that the wisdom of the world, its categories and its reckoning, is wholly useless before the power of God.

We *know*, don't we, that fives loaves and two fish cannot feed five thousand men,

"not counting women and children" (Mt 14:21). This makes me wonder how many other things we know for certain that just aren't so.

Coming to grips with such things that just aren't so, things that we once mistook as certain, things that had once formed the foundation of our whole world outlook, calls for humility. And humility takes courage.

It takes courage to say, "Wow, I was wrong about that" or "Wow, I was looking at suchand-such in the wrong way, but now I see."

This is what is sometimes called an ontological shock. Something happens in our lives, something we witness or realize just shakes us to the core of our being. This shock then produces a whole new way of seeing the world and relating to the world. This is called a paradigm shift. My

way of seeing the world (my paradigm) is shifted (moved). And I can't unsee what I now see. I can't go back. And I don't want to. It's an "amazing grace" moment: I once was blind, but now I see. This dynamic is at the heart of every conversion and is quite often how the Holy Spirit works in us to bring about *metanoia*.

The disciples of Jesus first experienced this at the wedding feast of Cana in Galilee, when Jesus turned gallons upon

gallons of water into wine. This was the first of Jesus's signs as recorded in the gospel of John: "and his disciples began to believe in him" (Jn 2:11).

They began to believe. Jesus would then give his disciples six more signs (for a total of seven). The fourth is the feeding of the five thousand. Each sign was meant to chip away at the disciples'

"certainties," based on a worldly way of thinking, and move them toward *metanoia*, a renewal of mind and heart.

Some could not handle the shock, the shift, and so they left Jesus. "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts" (Ps 95:7-8). But others could not turn away, even if they did not yet fully understand: "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of everlasting life" (Jn 6:68).
