

Collect for the Twentieth Sunday

O God, who have prepared for those who love you good things which no eye can see, fill our hearts, we pray, with the warmth of your love, so that, loving you in all things and above all things, we may attain your promises, which surpass every human desire.

From a treatise on Christian perfection by St Gregory of Nyssa, bishop (†394)

He is our peace, for he has made both one. Since we think of Christ as our peace, we may call ourselves true Christians only if our lives express Christ by our own peace. As the Apostle says: He has put enmity to death. We must never allow it to be rekindled in us in any way but must declare that it is absolutely dead. Gloriously has God slain enmity, in order to save us; may we never risk the life of our souls by being resentful or by bearing grudges. We must not awaken that enmity or call it back to life by our wickedness, for it is better left dead. No. since we possess Christ who is peace, we must put an end to this enmity and live as we believe he lived. He broke down the separating wall, uniting what was divided, bringing about peace by reconciling in his single person those who disagreed. In the same way, we must be reconciled not only with those who attack us from outside, but also with those who stir up dissension within; flesh then will no longer be opposed to the spirit, nor the spirit to the flesh. Once we subject the wisdom of the flesh to God's law, we shall be re-created as one single man at peace. Then, having become one instead of two, we shall have peace within ourselves.

From the Pastor's Desk

This Sunday and next we conclude reading from the sixth chapter of John's gospel, wherein Jesus speaks to his disciples about the bread of life. He teaches them that the manna that their ancestors ate in the desert and that the bread that he multiplied to feed the hungry thousands point to a greater reality: "the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." All that God had done

before to feed his people in their time of hunger and of need was a preparation for the "true food" and "true drink" that is the flesh and blood of Jesus, given for the life of the world.

When we approach the holy Eucharist, we are approaching the flesh and blood of the Lord Jesus. This is what the Eucharist is. Not mere bread, but Jesus's flesh and blood given for the life of the world. But the

Lord also teaches us in John 6 who the Eucharist is: "I am the bread of life."

In another context, the writer of the letter to the Hebrews reminds us who and what we are approaching when we draw near to God: "you have approached Mount Zion and the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and countless angels in festal gathering, and the assembly of the firstborn enrolled in heaven, and God the judge of all, and the spirits of the

just made perfect, and Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and the sprinkled blood that speaks more eloquently than that of Abel" (Heb 12:22-24).

The awesome reality of who the Eucharist is demands that we should approach the Body and the Blood with gratitude, "in reverence and awe" (Heb 20:28). So when we receive the Body and Blood, we must do so worthily, with real and true be-

lief, or as St Paul puts it: "A person should examine himself, and so eat the bread and drink the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgment on himself" (1 Cor 11:28-29).

These scriptural passages are the basis for the Church's ages-old insistence and teaching that if we are aware of having committed some mortal sin, some grave sin,

we must first approach the Lord in the sacrament of confession and be reconciled to God before we make bold to receive the Eucharist. Sancta sanctis! Holy things for the holy ones. Or with a little more liberty in translating: God's holy gifts for God's holy people. God's gift of mercy cleanses, prepares, and reconciles us so that we may worthily and reverently taste and see the Lord's goodness in the gift of the holy Eucharist.
