

O God, by whom we are redeemed and receive adoption, look graciously upon your beloved sons and daughters, that those who believe in Christ may receive true freedom and an everlasting inheritance.

From an instruction by St Columban, abbot (†615)

The fountain of life, the fountain of love, calls us to him and says: Whoever thirsts, let him come to me and drink. Understand well what you drink. Jeremiah would tell us: they abandoned me, the fountain of living water, says the Lord. The Lord himself, our God Jesus Christ, is the fountain of life, and accordingly he invites us to himself as to a fountain, that we may drink. Whoever loves him, drinks him. He drinks who is filled with the Word of God. He drinks who loves him fully and really desires him. He drinks who is on fire with the love of wisdom. Consider the source of the fountain: bread comes down to us from the same place, since the same one is the bread and the fountain, the only-begotten Son, our God, Christ the Lord, for whom we should always hunger. We may even eat him out of love for him. and devour him out of desire, longing for him eagerly. Let us drink from him, as from a fountain, with an abundance of love. May we drink him with the fullness of desire, and may we take pleasure in his sweetness and savor.

From the Pastor's Desk

In the Catholic calendar of the celebration of feast days for the saints, September 8 is reserved for the birth of the Virgin Mary. Now, the Scriptures are silent on Mary's birth, but an early Christian writing from mid to late 100s, called the *protoevangelium of James*, describes the early life of Mary and her parents, Joachim and Anne. The historical reliability of this ancient document is questioned, but at the very least it attests to the very development of Christian devotion and piety concerning Mary.

This particular Marian feast day began in the East, in Syria and Palestine, where the Church year began in September. And so, Mary's birth came to be commemorated in early September. It was this date, September 8, that helped determine, nineteen centuries later, the date for the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, December 8.

On December 8, the Church celebrates and contemplates God's unique action of preserving Mary from all stain of sin at the moment that she was conceived, in the normal human fashion, in the womb of her mother, St Anne. Then, nine months later, the Church celebrates the birth of Mary on September 8.

As Mary's parents, Joachim and Anne, received her as a gift from God, so one day Mary, with her husband, Joseph, would receive Jesus, a gift of the Most High, not only for them, but for the whole world. Isn't it remarkable that the drama of human salvation takes its origins in the human family? What God created from the beginning, man and woman, for the propagation of the human race, he then uses to enter human history, subjecting himself, Ruler and Creator, to the laws of the created order he himself brought into being.

With the birth of Mary, we are given another opportunity to contemplate the human family from a divine perspective. The marriage of a man and woman is the safest and most secure environment for the rearing of children. Strong and healthy marriages bring about strong and healthy societies. It is no wonder then, even from the beginning, that marriage would be attacked by the evil one, who would do anything to harm the union of those whom God has joined together.

Mary's birthday, then, is the perfect occasion for us to have recourse to her, who was daughter, wife and mother, for the graces that we need to lead happy, holy, and healthy family lives.

The Memorare

Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help, or sought thine intercession, was left unaided. Inspired by this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of virgins, my mother. To thee do I come, before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy mercy hear and answer me. Amen.
