

### From a second-century homily

We should repent of our sins while we are still on earth. When a potter is making a vessel and it becomes misshapen or breaks in his hands, he shapes it again; but once placed in the oven, it is beyond repair. Now the clay in the craftsman's hands is an image of ourselves, and it teaches us that, while still in this world. we must wholeheartedly repent of sins committed in the body and make it possible for the Lord to save us while there is time. When we have left this world, we shall no longer be able to repent and confess our sins. We must do the will of the Father, keep our bodies pure, and observe the commandments of the Lord, for this is the way to obtain eternal life. The Lord says in the gospel: If you have not been observant in small who will entrust you with matters. anything important? For I tell you that the man who is faithful in the smallest things is faithful in the greatest things as well. In other words, in order to obtain eternal life, we must remain pure and keep the seal of our baptism undefiled.

# From the Pastor's Desk

As Thanksgiving comes around this year, it falls on the latest possible day, November 28. This circumstance gives us ample time and opportunity to reflect with gratitude on the many things for which we must be thankful. It also gives us a chance to exercise the virtue of gratitude.

Gratitude is connected to the virtue of justice, perfecting and guaranteeing it in a sense. Justice means giving to others what belongs to them. Those who do

aood to us our benefactors have rightful claim on our thanks thanks. Our "belongs" to them. This is how we "repay" them for the good they have shown us. So gratitude is an obligation, but it is a gentle one.

A key aspect of repaying a favor is to receive it graciously. A second key

aspect is a certain promptness in expressing our gratitude. We do not want to delay our expression of gratitude to the point where it may seem that we are ungrateful, either by failing to acknowledge the favor received or by failing to express our appreciation for it.

Lack of gratitude is an unworthy trait in anyone who is aiming to be virtuous and to live in a virtuous manner. Jesus himself did not fail to thank his Father, even on the eve of his passion, when he took bread and wine, gave thanks to God for the gifts of food and drink, and shared

the gifts with his disciples, gift now become his own body and blood.

When we say grace before we eat (and after we eat), we are showing ourselves aware and grateful that what we are about to eat (or have just eaten) comes to us from God's bounty. One spiritual writer puts it this way: food is the love of God made edible. And when someone shows you love, how can gratitude not follow?

This is especially so for the love that God has shown us: "for God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that

> everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life" (Jn 3:16).

> Now when we receive the gift of the holy Eucharist, should we not spend some time in thanksgiving to God for this gift, for the body and blood of Jesus, given to us as a foretaste of life everlasting?

I want to encourage all of us to make a personal thanksgiving to God each time we receive holy communion. Whether we do this upon returning to our pews, in silence, while others receive, whether we stay after Mass for a few moments in prayerful thanksgiving, or whether we do this later, at home, let us not fail to express our gratitude to God for the sublime gift he has given us. "How can I repay the Lord for all the great good done for me?" asks Psalm 116. At the very least, I can say thank you, and mean it, aratitude and with in sincerity of heart. Fr Guillory
