

Collect for the first Sunday of Advent

Grant your faithful, we pray, almighty God, the resolve to run forth to meet your Christ with righteous deeds at his coming, so that, gathered at his right hand, they may be worthy to possess the heavenly kingdom.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church, nn. 522-524

The coming of God's Son to earth is an event of such immensity that God willed to prepare for it over centuries. He announces him through the mouths of the prophets who succeeded one another in Israel. Moreover, he awakens in the hearts of the pagans a dim expectation of this coming. St. John the Baptist is the Lord's immediate precursor or forerunner, sent to prepare his way. "Prophet of the Most High," John surpasses all the prophets, of whom he is the last. He inaugurates the Gospel, already from his mother's womb welcomes the coming of Christ, and rejoices in being "the friend of the bridegroom," whom he points out as "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." Going before Jesus "in the spirit and power of Elijah," John bears witness to Christ in his preaching, by his baptism of conversion, and through his martyrdom. When the Church celebrates the Advent liturgy each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for, by sharing in the long preparation for the Savior's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming.

From the Pastor's Desk

Well, happy new year! Beginning on the first Sunday of Advent, the Church begins the new liturgical year. This is a reminder that time is a mystery, and that we often operate in more than one concept of time.

The calendar year, also called the solar year, is governed by the earth's rotation around the sun. The lunar year – which we really don't use much any more, except for calculating the date of Easter – is derived from the moon's rotation around the earth. Then

there are fiscal years, and academic years, and so on.

When we reckon time, we most often speak of what the Greeks would call *chronos* or chronological time. *Chronos* is the quantitative measurement of time,

which accounts for the

amount of time between two events. It is sequential, measuring the temporal "distance" between things that happen.

But the Greeks had another concept of time, called *Kairos*. *Kairos* is the qualitative measurement of time, accounting for the "right time." It is not so much a sequential measurement as it is a feeling of fullness, rightness, readiness. Like harvest time. "It's time," we might say. Time to go, time to fight, time to play, time to party, time to say goodbye, etc.



Perhaps the most well known and poignant expressions of *kairos* come from the Book of Ecclesiastes, chapter 3: There is an appointed time for everything ... a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot, a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to seek and a time to lose, a time to be silent and a time to speak, a time to love and a time to hate, a time of war and a time of peace.

None of these "times" measure the "space" between two events. Rather, they indicate the rightness, the readiness of

what is about to happen. When the moment is right – a pregnant moment, as the expression goes – then it is fitting that certain things should come to pass.

St Paul, in his letter to the Galatians (4:4), spoke about the "fullness of time" that led God to send his Son to be born

of a woman. But here, curiously, he uses the term *chronos*. In his letter to the Ephesians (1:10), St Paul speaks about the mystery of God's will to sum all things up in Christ, in heaven and on earth. This, Paul writes, is God's plan "for the fullness of times," using the term *kairos*.

As Advent begins, then, we begin to count the days (*chronos*), awaiting the fullness of time when all will be ready, and time itself will be pregnant, and we will again rejoice because it is a maiden's time (*kairos*) to give birth.
