

Collect for the Third Sunday of Advent

O God, who see how your people faithfully await the feast of the Lord's Nativity, enable us, we pray, to attain the joys of so great a salvation and to celebrate them always with solemn worship and glad rejoicing.

Stewardship Moment

The end of the calendar year means that many people are looking to make end-of-year financial contributions to the charities and churches that they support. This can be done in many ways. For those in their 70s and older, direct gifts drawn on individual retirement accounts (IRAs) are one possibility that offers some unique advantages.

For instance, if you are 70½ or older, you can give any amount up to \$105,000 from your IRA directly to St Patrick's, which is a registered non-profit (federal tax ID number 72-053-3609). You will not pay income taxes on the transfer. If you are required to take minimum distributions, you can use your gift to satisfy all or part of vour obligation. Your deadline: Your IRA administrator must remove the funds from your account by December 31 for your donation to qualify this year. If you have check-writing features on your IRA, your check must clear your account by December 31 to count toward your required minimum distribution for the calendar year.

Be sure to consult your financial advisers, who can help you decide how to support your preferred charities in the most tax advantageous ways.

The Third Sunday of Advent is called "Gaudete Sunday." Gaudete is the Latin word for the command to rejoice. This is taken from the entrance antiphon of today's Mass, which is taken from St Paul's letter to the Philippians: Rejoice in the Lord always; I say again, rejoice! Indeed the Lord is near (4:4-5).

The opening prayer of this Mass, called the collect (found inside the bulletin) also mentions joy and rejoicing, as do the first

reading from the prophet Zephaniah -Shout for joy, daughter Zion! Sing iovfully. O Israel! Be glad and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! and the abovecited second reading Philippians. Today's responsorial psalm, which actually taken from the prophet Isaiah, also expresses joy Lord's the at presence in our midst.

The Catholic Church expresses her joy at the nearness of Christmas Day — when the Savior will be born into our world, who is *light from light, true God from true God* — also by (optionally) changing the color of the vestments worn for Mass. The color rose, being a lighter shade of violet, can be used to express our growing Advent joy as Christmas draws near. This is also why the third candle of the Advent wreath is the color rose.

As the end of the calendar year draws near, and in the spirit of giving and gratitude that marks this season, I want to acknowledge and thank all our parishioners who support St Patrick's. That support comes in so many ways.

First, there is the support of presence. Just being here is a great gift. People from all walks of life are drawn to the intimate setting of our little church and the friendly welcome they receive from St Patricians. There is no doubt that our little

parish has been growing, and this is a reason for gratitude and for rejoicing!

Second there is the support of service. Many St Patricians serve our church in various ministries and through our outreach services. This you

do out of love for

the Lord in whose

name we faithfully gather to celebrate his presence among us in the scriptures and in the breaking of the bread.

Finally, there is financial support, which you St Patricians give so generously for the renewal of our parish facilities and programs and as a sign of our Christian commitment to service, especially to the poor.
