

Stewardship Moment

The end of the calendar year means that many people are looking to make end-ofyear financial contributions to the charities and churches that they support. This can be done in many ways. For those in their 70s and older, direct gifts drawn on individual retirement accounts (IRAs) are one possibility that offers some unique advantages.

For instance, if you are 70¹/₂ or older, you can give any amount up to \$105,000 from your IRA directly to St Patrick's, which is a registered non-profit (federal tax ID number 72-053-3609). You will not pay income taxes on the transfer. If you are required to take minimum distributions, you can use your gift to satisfy all or part of your obligation. Your deadline: Your IRA administrator must remove the funds from your account by December 31 for your donation to qualify this year. If you have check-writing features on your IRA. your check must clear your account by December 31 to count toward your required minimum distribution for the calendar year.

From the Pastor's Desk

For the past several weeks we have been singing the Our Father, and it seems to me that each week our singing grows more confident as we become more comfortable singing together. Our individual voices naturally harmonize and become one in prayer as we pray to the Father in the words our Savior gave us.

At Mass, immediately after the Our Father, the priest alone continues with a prayer, called the *embolism*, from a Greek word meaning, "an interpolation or insertion." The embolism is a very ancient

liturgical prayer, found in nearly all the ancient liturgical manuscripts for the celebration of the holy Eucharist.

As the embolism begins, it repeats the last line of the Our Father – "but deliver us from evil" – "Deliver us, Lord, we pray from evil..." The priest takes up, as it were, the

prayer of the whole congregation, as he prays directly to the Lord for the intentions of the people of God, who are in a state of expectancy, waiting in hope for the coming of Christ.

While the Our Father contains seven "petitions" – 1) God's name be holy; 2) God's kingdom come; 3) God's will be done; 4) we receive daily bread; 5) our trespasses be forgiven; 6) we be kept from temptation; and 7) delivered from evil – the embolism contains three "petitions," that we be 1) delivered from every evil; 2) granted peace in our day; 3)



always free from sin and safe from distress. By the embolism prayer, the priest asks God that deliverance, peace, freedom and safety be granted to us, who are awaiting the blessed hope and the coming of Christ, who has taught us how to pray and whose words we have just faithfully recited, praying to the Father, our Father.

After the embolism the people conclude the prayer, ratifying what the priest has asked God in the embolism and giving the motivation that justifies such a prayer: "For the kingdom the power and the glory are yours now and forever."

> Liturgically, the Lord's prayer takes this form: 1) the priest invites all to pray; 2) the priest and people together pray the Our Father; 3) the priest alone prays the embolism; 4) the people (alone) conclude the prayer. In this we see how the roles of the priest and people are complementary at Mass,

each attending to their own parts in the liturgy, sometimes speaking alone, sometimes together, but always prayerfully and with meaning.

Understanding the structure of our liturgical prayer can help us enter the meaning of the moment, so that what we do, we do with understanding and not by mere habit. In this way, we pray not only with our lips and voices, but also with our minds and hearts, as we lift them up to the Lord, to give thanks to the Lord our God, which is right and just. **The Guillong**
