

Collect for the Eighth Sunday

Grant us, O Lord, we pray, that the course of our world may be directed by your peaceful rule and that your Church may rejoice, untroubled in her devotion.

From a homily on prayer by St John Chrysostom, bishop (†407)

Prayer and converse with God is a supreme good, a partnership and union with God. I do not mean the prayer of outward observance but prayer from the heart, not confined to fixed times or periods, but continuous throughout the day and night. Prayer is the light of the spirit, true knowledge of God, mediating between God and man. The spirit, raised up to heaven by prayer, clings to God with the utmost tenderness. Like a child crying tearfully for its mother, prayer craves the milk that God provides. It seeks the satisfaction of its own desires and receives gifts outweighing the whole world of nature. Prayer gives joy to the spirit, peace to the heart. I speak of prayer, not words. Prayer is the longing for God, love too deep for words, a gift not given by man but by God's grace. When the Lord gives this kind of prayer to someone, he gives him riches that cannot be taken away, heavenly food that satisfies the spirit. One who tastes this food is set on fire with an eternal longing for the Lord. His spirit burns as in a fire of the utmost intensity.

From the Pastor's Desk

This coming Wednesday, March 5, is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. While many Catholics do attend Mass on Ash Wednesday, it is not a day of obligation. However, we feel drawn to the Ash Wednesday celebration of the Eucharist as a fitting way to begin the Lenten season, which is symbolized by the distribution of ashes.

When we are marked by ashes, the following words are said, Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. From the dust of the earth God created

man (Gen 2:7), and breathed life into him so that he became a living being. When, at the moment of our death, the breath of life leaves us, we return to the dust from which we were drawn.

All of our Lenten practices and penances are meant to remind us of this reality, that

one day we shall die. So we prepare ourselves for that day be denying ourselves some worldly comforts and by seeking the higher things that belong to heaven. This is the sense of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent. It is a rehearsal for our death, so that we when we die, we may do so ready and prepared, so that we may freely and acceptingly leave behind the things of this life and long for the life of the world to come.

It is useless for us to deny this reality or try to gloss over it or ignore it. Lent is about facing the realities of life and death and preparing ourselves, as disciples of the Lord Jesus, to inherit the kingdom that he promises to those who do the will of his heavenly Father.

I remind you that on Ash Wednesday, a collection will be taken for Catholic Charities of Acadiana. Your contribution to this collection will go to help the poor throughout the Diocese of Lafayette, to those most in need. It is a good way to begin the almsgiving that is required of us during Lent, and every day of our lives. Remember the words of the Lord from last Sunday's Gospel: give to everyone who asks of you.



Finally, the St Patrick's breakfast is scheduled for Saturday, March 15, beginning at 8 a.m., at City Club in River Ranch. Please sign up if you plan to attend. There is no cost. This event is simply about time together in fellowship, to meet fellow

St Patricians in a casual and relaxed atmosphere. I encourage you to get to know people you don't already know. We may see each other at Mass, but we don't know each other. Our parish socials are just the right occasion to slow down and visit with familiar faces. We already have a lot in common: our Catholic faith, our love of St Patrick's!
