O God, who through your Word reconcile the human race to yourself in a wonderful way, grant, we pray, that with prompt devotion and eager faith the Christian people may hasten toward the solemn celebrations to come.

From the treatise on Flight from the World, by St Ambrose, bishop (†397)

Where your heart is, there is your treasure also. God is not accustomed to refusing a good gift to those who ask for one. Since God is good, and especially to those who are faithful to him, let us hold fast to him with all our soul, our heart, our strength, and so enjoy his light and see his glory and possess the grace of supernatural joy. Let us reach out with our hearts to possess that good, let us exist in it and live in it, let us hold fast to it, that good which is beyond all we can know or see and is marked by perpetual peace and tranquility, a peace which is beyond all we can know or understand. This is the good that permeates creation. In it we all live, on it we all depend. It has nothing above it; it is divine. No one is good but God alone. What is good is therefore divine, what is divine is therefore good. Scripture says: When you open your hand all things will be filled with goodness. It is through God's goodness that all that is truly good is given us, and in it there is no admixture of evil. These good things are promised by Scripture to those who are faithful: The good things of the land will be your food.

From the Pastor's Desk

The fourth Sunday of Lent is sometimes called *Laetare Sunday*, from the entrance antiphon of the Mass, which begins, *Laetare, Ierusalem...* Rejoice, Jerusalem. In the midst of Lent, the Church gives a hint at the joy that is to come. On this Sunday, there is an option to use rose (pink) as the liturgical color instead of purple (violet), to express the joy that we

anticipate as we dedicate ourselves even more steadfastly to the demands of our Lenten disciplines: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

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The last week of Lent, following Palm Sunday, is commonly called Holy Week. On Thursday of Holy week (April 17), the only Mass permitted, except for the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral, is the Mass of the Lord's Supper, when we relive and reenact the Holy Institution of the the Eucharist and

washing of the feet. At the end of this Mass, we accompany Jesus into the Garden of Gethsemane as the holy Eucharist is removed from the church in procession to the adoration chapel.

On Friday of Holy Week (April 18), commonly called Good Friday, Mass is not celebrated at all. Rather, Holy Communion is distributed during the Good Friday Service, where we read the

Passion account from St John's Gospel, venerate the wood of the cross, and pray to God with special intercessory prayers.

Finally, on Saturday of Holy Week (April 19), the Easter Vigil begins after dusk, at 8 p.m., with the blessing of the Easter fire. At this ancient and lengthy liturgy, seven readings from the Old Testament and two from the New Testament recall all of salvation history, leading up to the

resurrection of Jesus from the dead. At this liturgy, the faithful renew their baptismal vows, are sprinkled with water, and experience the joy and wonder of the empty tomb.

These ancient liturgical celebrations are called the Holy Triduum. *Triduum* is a Latin word meaning a three-day period. In the Triduum we commemorate the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus by reverently celebrating these solemn liturgies.

The Triduum is a special time, and the liturgies of the Triduum are ancient, unique, and spiritually moving. I want to encourage all St Patricians to make the effort to attend as many of the Triduum liturgies as possible. It is a wonderful capstone of the Lenten season that leads us into a more joyful and faith-filled celebration of the great mystery of the Lord's resurrection.
