

### **Collect for Twenty-seventh Sunday**

Almighty ever-living God, who in the abundance of your kindness surpass the merits and the desires of those who entreat you, pour out your mercy upon us to pardon what conscience dreads and to give what prayer does not dare to ask.

# From the Catechism, on the seventh commandment, nn. 2407-2408

In economic matters, respect for human dignity requires the practice of the virtue of temperance, so as to moderate attachment to this world's goods; the practice of the virtue of justice, to preserve our neighbor's rights and render him what is his due; and the practice of solidarity, in accordance with the golden rule and in keeping with the generosity of the Lord, who "though he was rich, yet for your sake ... became poor so that by his poverty, you might become rich." The seventh commandment forbids theft, that is, usurping another's property against the reasonable will of the owner. There is no theft if consent can be presumed or if refusal is contrary to reason and the universal destination of goods. This is the case in obvious and urgent necessity when the only way to provide for immediate, essential needs (food, shelter, clothing...) is to put at one's disposal and use the property of others.

This coming week I will be away on my annual retreat, organized by the Diocese of Lafayette and held at the St Charles Center in Moss Bluff. During my absence, several priests of our Diocese will be covering the Masses at St Patrick's.

Next weekend, though, October 11-12, a priest from the Diocese of Long Xuyen in Vietnam will be visiting. Fr Vincent Tuan

Vu will say the weekend Masses, where he will also speak about the Church in Vietnam and how we at St Patrick's can support them his diocese in particular. Fr Vincent's visit is organized and approved through our diocese's missionary cooperation plan. The following Sunday, October 19, is World Mission Sunday, when a special worldwide second collection is taken to support the Church's missionary activities throughout the world. Praying the rosary typically entails reciting 50 Hail Marys, divided into five groups of ten (decades), along with other prayers such as the Our Father, the Glory Be, and much later on the Fatima prayer.
